1 I, Brent Panas, declare and state as follows:

2 1. I am employed with the County of San Diego, and I am currently serving as Chief of the
3 County's COVID-19 Safe Reopening Compliance Team. Additionally, I hold the position of Chief of
4 Departmental Operations for the Code Compliance Division of the County's Land Use and Environment
5 Group, Planning and Development Services. I make this declaration based on my personal knowledge,
6 my work experience, and my review of and familiarity with the public records attached to this
7 declaration as exhibits, as well as the County's and State of California's COVID-19 public health data,
8 and public health orders, regulations, and guidelines, which are publicly available and regularly updated
9 on the County's and State's respective COVID-19-related websites,
10 www.sandiegocounty.gov/coronavirus/ and www.covid19.ca.gov/.

11 2. In my position as Chief of the County's COVID-19 Safe Reopening Compliance Team, I
12 coordinate and oversee the County's receipt, investigation of, and response to complaints concerning
13 alleged violations of the County's COVID-19 "Order of the Health Officer and Emergency Regulations"
14 (hereafter, "Public Health Order"), which is amended from time to time, and incorporates various,
15 specified COVID-19 guidelines and regulations issued by the State of California. A true and correct
16 copy of the County's current Public Health Order¹, effective November 21, 2020, is attached hereto as
17 Exhibit 1. The current Public Health Order is also accessible online at
18 [https://www.sandiegocounty.gov/content/sdc/hhsa/programs/phs/community_epidemiology/dc/2019-](https://www.sandiegocounty.gov/content/sdc/hhsa/programs/phs/community_epidemiology/dc/2019-nCoV/health-order.html)
19 [nCoV/health-order.html](https://www.sandiegocounty.gov/content/sdc/hhsa/programs/phs/community_epidemiology/dc/2019-nCoV/health-order.html).

20 3. The County's Public Health Order provides that when the State of California has issued
21 an industry guidance, or any subsequent amendments thereto, with mandatory or suggested restrictions
22 and/or measures to be implemented by a particular sector of an "essential" or "reopened" business (as
23 defined by the Public Health Order), every such business in that sector must comply with the State
24 guidance. [See, Public Health Order, Exh. 1 hereto, at ¶¶ 10(c) and 11(e).] With respect to Plaintiffs'

1 operations (which combine restaurant/food-service operations with live performances), the applicable
2 State industry guidance that must be complied with includes the State's COVID-19 Industry Guidance:
3 Restaurants, as amended November 24, 2020 (hereafter, "Restaurant Industry Guidance"). A true and
4 correct copy of the Restaurant Industry Guidance is attached hereto as Exhibit 2, and is available online
5 at <https://files.covid19.ca.gov/pdf/guidance-dine-in-restaurants.pdf>.

6 4. The COVID-19 pandemic continues to represent a devastating public health crisis
7 throughout the nation, the State of California, and the County of San Diego. As of December 2, 2020
8 (with data through December 1, 2020), in the United States of America almost 14 million COVID-19
9 infections have been confirmed, with more than 275,000 COVID-19 related deaths. In the State of
10 California, 1,245,948 individuals have tested positive for COVID-19 through December 1 (an increase
11 of 20,759 cases from just the day before), with 19,342 COVID-19 deaths in the State (113 additional
12 deaths from the day before). And in the County of San Diego, with data through December 1, 2020, a
13 total of 84,638 individuals have tested positive for COVID-19 (1,217 more than just the day before),
14 with 1,035 individuals having died in the County as a result of COVID-19 (16 additional deaths than the
15 day before). Over 140 individuals have died from COVID-19 in the County of San Diego just in the last
16 month from when the County opposed Plaintiff's application for a Temporary Restraining Order in this
17 action, until now.

18 5. On November 30, 2020, seventeen new community COVID-19 outbreaks were
19 confirmed. For the seven day period from November 24 through November 30, 2020, 81 community
20 outbreaks were confirmed. The number of community outbreaks the County is experiencing and
21 documenting remains far above the trigger of seven or more outbreaks in a seven-day period. A
22 community outbreak setting is defined as three or more COVID-19 cases in a setting and in people of
23 different households over the past 14 days.

24 6. The County's public health response to the COVID-19 public health crisis includes
25 enforcement of its Public Health Order, which as noted incorporates by reference several of the State's
26 COVID-19 guidelines and regulations. As the Governor and other State officials have made clear, local
27 governments (including the County of San Diego) do not have authority to relax the State's COVID-19
28 public health restrictions and orders. While counties can adopt stricter requirements in their public

1 health orders, they cannot affirmatively permit activities or business operations that violate the State's
2 guidelines and orders.

3 7. At the present time, the State has placed the County of San Diego (and the vast majority
4 of counties in this State) in the most restrictive tier under the State's COVID-19 orders – specifically,
5 the State's Blueprint for a Safer Economy ("Blueprint"), which is available online at
6 <https://covid19.ca.gov/safer-economy/>. The County is currently in Tier 1 of the State's Blueprint,
7 otherwise known as the purple or widespread tier. As the State's Blueprint and current Restaurant
8 Industry Guidance provide, for counties in the purple tier, restaurant operations (including restaurant
9 operations with live performances) are permitted, but are limited to outdoor operations (with specified
10 restrictions). Similarly, under the State's Blueprint, for counties in the purple tier, religious services,
11 protests, gym and fitness centers, and multiple other activities and sectors, are limited to outdoor
12 operations. When the State moves a county into a less restrictive tier (such as the red, orange, or yellow
13 tier), the State's Blueprint and Restaurant Industry Guidance allow for the resumption of indoor
14 restaurant operations, including with live performances, subject to specified restrictions. [See, Exh. 2,
15 Restaurant Industry Guidance, at p. 3.]

16 8. The County's enforcement of its Public Health Order is complaint driven. The County
17 does not have the resources to continually inspect all business establishments and other activities
18 throughout the County to ensure compliance with the Public Health Order. Currently, the County
19 receives approximately 500 complaints each day from members of the public and other individuals and
20 agencies, regarding a business's or other entity's perceived violation of applicable COVID-19
21 restrictions. To the greatest extent possible (as constrained by resource and personnel levels), the County
22 investigates the complaint and, if a violation of the Public Health Order is confirmed, the County may
23 send the business or other establishment a cease-and-desist letter, notifying the business of the nature of
24 the violation, the requirements under the Public Health Order (including incorporated State regulations),
25 and the potential consequences and enforcement options if the violations continue. For example,
26 attached hereto as Exhibit 3 is a true and correct copy of an October 13, 2020, letter sent by the San
27 Diego Police Department ("SDPD") to plaintiff Midway Venture, LLC dba Pacers, notifying plaintiff
28 that an SDPD detective had observed operations at Pacers that violated the Public Health Order then in

1 effect. SDPD provided the County with a copy of this letter and notice of the violation, and the County
2 sent plaintiff a cease-and-desist letter the following day, October 14, 2020.

3 9. The goal of the County's cease-and-desist letters is to obtain voluntary compliance with
4 the Public Health Order, by informing the recipient of the requirements of the order and the nature of the
5 violation, in an attempt to convince the recipient to cease activities that violate the applicable COVID-19
6 mitigation measures and restrictions. The County has the authority to enforce its public health orders
7 under applicable law, in light of the serious adverse public health consequences of COVID-19 outbreaks
8 and transmission, which the public health orders aim to prevent or slow, and the significance of the
9 public-health threat posed by a particular violation. And while voluntary compliance is the goal, the
10 cease-and-desist letters also inform the recipient of enforcement options that may be implemented if the
11 violations continue.

12 10. If the County's efforts to obtain voluntary compliance with its Public Health Order
13 (including the State industry guidance and orders incorporated therein) are unsuccessful, the County
14 retains discretion to issue an Immediate Closure Order, mandating that the business or other entity
15 immediately close or cease operations until a Safe Reopening Plan is approved, or to otherwise enforce
16 the orders, such as through issuance of a citation.

17 11. Through November 30, 2020, the County has issued 125 cease-and-desist letters
18 regarding violations of the Public Health Order. True and correct copies of the cease-and-desist letters
19 are attached collectively hereto as Exhibit 4, and are also available online at
20 [https://www.sandiegocounty.gov/content/sdc/hhsa/programs/phs/community_epidemiology/dc/2019-](https://www.sandiegocounty.gov/content/sdc/hhsa/programs/phs/community_epidemiology/dc/2019-nCoV/closure-orders.html)
21 [nCoV/closure-orders.html](https://www.sandiegocounty.gov/content/sdc/hhsa/programs/phs/community_epidemiology/dc/2019-nCoV/closure-orders.html).

22 12. With respect to the County's stepped-up enforcement measures of actually serving
23 businesses or other entities with an Order of the Health Officer requiring the business or other entity to
24 immediately close its facilities and cease operations until a Safe Reopening Plan is presented and
25 approved by the County, seven such Immediate Closure Orders have been issued by the County through
26 November 30, 2020. True and correct copies of the seven Immediate Closure Orders issued by the
27 County this year are attached collectively hereto as Exhibit 5, and are also available online at
28

3 13. The County has issued cease-and-desist letters and Immediate Closure Orders concerning
4 a wide array of business and other activities, including gyms, fitness centers, yoga studios, bars,
5 restaurants, spas, fraternities and sororities, religious entities, and entertainment centers.

6 14. Contrary to plaintiffs' suggestions in this action, the County neither approved nor
7 permitted live entertainment and performances at Plaintiffs' establishments in violation of the then-
8 existing Public Health Order and, more specifically, the applicable State guidelines and regulations that
9 the County's Public Health Orders have incorporated by reference. To the extent that Plaintiffs' business
10 operations, including performances, are permitted by the revised, current State COVID-19 Industry
11 Guidance for Restaurants, such operations are thus likewise permitted under the County's Public Health
12 Order (which has incorporated the State's Industry Guidance), subject to compliance with the COVID-
13 19 mitigation conditions and restrictions of that Industry Guidance and the Public Health Order.

14 15. Plaintiffs' businesses were not the only establishments that received a cease-and-desist
15 letter from the County concerning live entertainment taking place in violation of the then-applicable
16 State COVID-19 restrictions and Public Health Order. As stated, the County's enforcement of its Public
17 Health Orders is complaint driven. When the County has received and documented a complaint of live
18 entertainment/performances occurring in violation of an applicable COVID-19 public health restriction,
19 the County has issued cease-and-desist letters or Immediate Closure Orders as appropriate, and has
20 made efforts to obtain compliance with the applicable health rules. By way of example, in addition to
21 the cease-and-desist letters sent to plaintiffs, the County has issued the following cease-and-desist letters
22 and Immediate Closure Orders to establishments that were documented to be offering live entertainment
23 in violation of the Public Health Order (including applicable State industry guidance) in effect at the
24 time:

- 25 • On September 29, 2020, the County issued a cease-and-desist letter to Andale Restaurant
26 Bar in Bonita, following documentation of the restaurant/bar putting on live
27 entertainment at their location. [*See*, Exh. 4 hereto, at page CSD-C&D-015];
28

- On October 9, 2020, the County issued an Immediate Closure Order to Bay Bridge Brewing in Chula Vista, following confirmation that a live comedy show had taken place at the establishment, that other violations of the Public Health Order had been confirmed, and in light of a previous cease-and-desist letter having been received by the business without a subsequent cessation of the activity that violated applicable COVID-19 mitigation measures. [See, Exh. 5 hereto, at Bates stamped pages CSD-ICO-012 to 013];
- On October 23, 2020, the County issued a cease-and-desist letter to McFarlane Productions, Inc., following verification that the recipient’s business operations included staging “Carnevil” type events consisting of pop-up restaurants with live entertainment, such as performances by jugglers, clowns, and puppeteers. [See, Exh. 4 hereto, at page CSD-C&D-018]; and
- On October 29, 2020, the County issued a cease-and-desist letter with respect to live entertainment taking place at the Wokou Ramen & Yakitori, and Death by Tequila, establishments in San Diego. [See, Exh. 4 hereto, at page CSD-C&D-019].

16. Plaintiffs’ business establishments that are the subject of this action (Pacers and Cheetahs) are located within the City of San Diego. The live adult entertainment portion of Plaintiffs’ business operations are licensed and heavy regulated under the City of San Diego’s municipal code, which are enforced by the City and the San Diego Police Department, not the County. [See, e.g., City of San Diego Municipal Code Chapter 3, Article 3 (“Police Regulated Occupations and Businesses”), Divisions 1, 2, 3, 5, and 36 (“Nude Entertainment Business”).] While the County has authority to enforce its public health orders at businesses within incorporated cities, including Plaintiffs’ businesses, the issue of whether Plaintiffs are permitted to conduct live adult entertainment or performances outdoors at their locations within the City of San Diego is a matter governed by the City of San Diego and SDPD, not the County (other than compliance with the applicable public health orders).

I declare under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California that the foregoing is true and correct.

ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER AND EMERGENCY REGULATIONS

(Effective November 21, 2020)

Pursuant to California Health and Safety Code sections 101040, 120175, and 120175.5 (b) the Health Officer of the County of San Diego (Health Officer) **ORDERS AS FOLLOWS:**

Effective 12:01 a.m. on Saturday, November 21, 2020, and continuing until further notice, the following will be in effect for San Diego County (county):

1. All persons are to remain in their homes or at their place of residence, except for employees or customers traveling to and from essential businesses or reopened businesses as defined in sections 10 and 11, below, or to participate in individual or family outdoor activity as allowed by this Order.
2. All “gatherings,” as defined in the California Department of Public Health Guidance for Private Gatherings found at <https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/CDPH-Guidance-for-the-Prevention-of-COVID-19-Transmission-for-Gatherings-10-09.aspx>, shall comply with both said guidance, and the Limited Stay at Home Order issued by the California Health Officer on November 19, 2020 found at: <https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/limited-stay-at-home-order.aspx>. Gatherings not in compliance are prohibited.
3. SCHOOLS
 - a. All public, charter, and private schools may hold classes and other school activities only under circumstances permitted by the State and in compliance with the [COVID-19 Industry Guidance: Schools and School - Based Programs](#), and as may be updated or superseded by further State guidance. Institutions of higher education may hold classes or other school activities only under circumstances permitted by the State and in compliance with the [COVID – 19 Industry Guidance: Institutions of Higher Education](#) and as may be updated or superseded by further State guidance. A written,

worksite-specific COVID-19 prevention plan as stated in their applicable state guidance may be used by schools and institutions of higher education in lieu of a Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol or Safe Reopening Plan.

- b. All school districts, charter schools, and private schools serving grades TK – 12 inclusive, shall report the following to the San Diego County Office of Education (SDCOE) on or before the second and fourth Monday of each month, in a format designated by SDCOE:
 - i. Number of students participating in full-time in-person learning, by school site and school district, if applicable.
 - ii. Number of students participating in hybrid learning (a mix of in-person and distance learning) by school site and school district, if applicable.
 - iii. Number of students participating in distance learning by school site and school district, if applicable.
 - iv. Number of school employees who work onsite at a school, by school site and school district, if applicable.
 - v. The name, email, mailing address, and phone number of the person responsible for responding to complaints regarding COVID-19 prevention, by school site and school district, if applicable.

SDCOE shall report this information to the County of San Diego by the end of business on the following day (Tuesday) and shall post this information on its publicly facing website.

- c. All school districts, charter schools, and private schools serving grades TK – 12 inclusive, as required in the most recent *COVID -19 Industry Guidance: Schools and School-Based Programs*, shall notify local health officials immediately of any positive case of COVID-19, and exposed staff and families, as relevant, while maintaining confidentiality as required by state and federal laws.
4. Child daycare and child care providers shall operate in compliance with the measures set forth in State [COVID-19 Updated Guidance: Child Care Programs and Providers](#) and shall prepare and post a Safe Reopening Plan pursuant to section 11c, below.
 5. “Non-essential personnel,” as defined in section 15a below, are prohibited from entry into any hospital or long-term care facility. All essential personnel who are COVID-19 positive or show any potential signs or symptoms of COVID-19 are strictly prohibited from entry into hospitals or long-term care facilities. Notwithstanding the foregoing, individuals requiring medical care for COVID-19 or related conditions may be admitted to hospitals or other

medical facilities if the hospital or medical facility is appropriate for treating COVID-19 and has adequate precautions in place to protect its patients, medical personnel and staff.

6. Hospitals and [healthcare providers](#), including dentists shall:
 - a. Take measures to preserve and prioritize resources; and,
 - b. May authorize and perform non-emergent or elective surgeries or procedures based on their determination of clinical need and supply capacity, and where consistent with State guidance.
 - c. Nothing in this Order shall prevent physicians and other healthcare providers from conducting routine preventive care provided it conforms to any applicable State guidance.
 - d. Nothing in this Order shall prevent dentists or dental hygienists from conducting routine preventive care provided it conforms to any applicable State guidance.
7. Hospitals, healthcare providers, pharmacies, commercial testing laboratories, and any other setting conducting testing shall report all positive and non-positive (i.e., negative, indeterminate, and specimen unsatisfactory) test results from nucleic acid amplification tests, antibody tests, and antigen diagnostic tests for SARS-CoV-2 to the Public Health Officer immediately after such results are received.
8. Face coverings shall be worn as described and required in California Department of Public Health Face Covering Guidance issued on November 16, 2020, (available at: <https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/guidance-for-face-coverings.aspx>).
9. All businesses not meeting the definition of essential business or reopened business in section 10 and 11 below are referred to in this Order as “non-essential businesses” and shall be and remain closed for the duration of this Order. All essential businesses and reopened businesses must comply with the requirements of this Order. Notwithstanding the foregoing, any business may remain open if its employees and owners can provide its services from home, including by telecommuting, without direct contact with the public.

10. ESSENTIAL BUSINESSES

- a. “Essential business” is any business or activity (or a business/activity that employs/utilizes workers) designated by the State Public Health Officer as “Essential Critical Infrastructure Workers” set forth in: <https://covid19.ca.gov/img/EssentialCriticalInfrastructureWorkers.pdf>) as that list may be updated from time-to-time, and

referenced in Executive Order N-33-20 issued by the Governor of the State of California.

- b. All essential businesses that allow members of the public to enter a facility must prepare and post a “Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol” on the form available at: https://www.sandiegocounty.gov/content/dam/sdc/hhsa/programs/phs/Epidemiology/covid19/SOCIAL_DISTANCING_AND_SANITATION_PROTOCOL_04022020_V1.pdf), or on a form required by another governmental entity requiring substantially similar information, for each of their facilities open to the public in the county. The Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol must be posted at or near the entrance of the relevant facility, and shall be easily viewable by the public and employees. A copy of the Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol must also be provided to each employee performing work at the facility. All essential businesses shall implement the Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol and provide evidence of its implementation to any authority enforcing this Order upon demand. The Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol must describe all measures required in section c below. Any business that fails to prepare and successfully implement a Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol shall immediately close.
- c. When the State of California has issued an [industry guidance](#), or any subsequent amendments thereto, with mandatory or suggested restrictions and/or measures to be implemented by a particular sector of essential business, every essential business in that sector must comply with the guidance and shall include in its Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol (prepared pursuant to section b, above) all of the measures listed in the industry guidance. Any mandatory measures required by this Order must also be included in a Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol.

11. REOPENED BUSINESSES

- a. “Reopened business” is a business that is not an essential business as defined in section 10a above, and has reopened in conformance with the State of California’s Plan for Reducing COVID-19 and Adjusting Permitted Sector Activities to Keep Californians Healthy and Safe (available at <https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/COVID19CountyMonitoringOverview.aspx>

Statewide Public Health Officer Order, issued by the California Department of Health Services on August 28, 2020, all portions of which are operative in San Diego County effective immediately, and available at {

https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/CDPH%20Document%20Library/C_OVID-19/8-28-20_Order-Plan-Reducing-COVID19-Adjusting-Permitted-Sectors-Signed.pdf}. A reopened business may open when the Public Health Officer has posted an acknowledgement of the reopened status on the County of San Diego Coronavirus website and the business has complied with the requirements of this Order.

- b. The State of California’s Blueprint for a Safer Economy establishes a four tier system for reopening business sectors. Those business sectors listed in the [Activities and Business Tiers](#) table are allowed to reopen per San Diego’s tier assignment and under the conditions set forth in the chart.
 - i. Every business in the following sectors listed in the [Activities and Business Tiers](#) that are permitted to operate indoors shall require all customers who receive services indoors or use indoor facilities to sign in with their name and telephone number:
 - 1. Hair Salons & Barbershops
 - 2. Personal Care Services
- c. All reopened businesses, with the exception of restaurants, bars, wineries, distilleries and breweries which do not limit services to take-out or delivery, must prepare and post a “Safe Reopening Plan” on the form available at: https://www.sandiegocounty.gov/content/dam/sdc/hhsa/programs/phs/Epidemiology/covid19/Community_Sector_Support/BusinessesandEmployers/SafeReopeningPlanTemplate.pdf for each of their facilities in the county. Restaurants bars, wineries, distilleries and breweries which do not limit services to take-out or delivery, must prepare and post a “COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol” on the form found at https://www.sandiegocounty.gov/content/dam/sdc/deh/fhd/food/pdf/covid19sdrestaurantoperatingprotocol_en.pdf for each restaurant in the county.
- d. The Safe Reopening Plan or COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol must be posted at or near the entrance of the relevant facility, and shall be easily viewable by the public and employees. A copy of the Safe Reopening Plan or COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol must also be provided to each employee performing work at the facility. All reopened businesses shall implement the Safe Reopening Plan or COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol and provide evidence of its implementation to any authority enforcing this Order upon demand. The Safe Reopening Plan or COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol must describe all measures required in section e, below. Any business that fails to prepare and comply with its Safe Reopening Plan or COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol shall immediately close.
- e. When the State of California has issued an [industry guidance](#), or any subsequent

amendments thereto, with mandatory or suggested restrictions and/or measures to be implemented by a particular sector of reopened business, every reopened business in that sector must comply with the guidance and shall include in its Safe Reopening Plan or COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol (prepared pursuant to section c, above) all of the measures listed in the industry guidance. Any mandatory measures required by this Order must also be included in a Social Distancing and Sanitation Protocol.

f. All restaurants, bars, wineries, distilleries and breweries shall be closed from 10:00 p.m. until 5:00 a.m. every day except for delivery, take-out, and drive-thru.

12. Each essential business and reopened business shall take all of the following actions if an employer becomes aware that an employee is diagnosed with COVID-19:

- a. Promptly notify the County Department of Public Health that there is an employee that is laboratory-confirmed diagnosed with COVID-19, together with the name, date of birth, and contact information of the employee.
- b. Cooperate with the County Department of Public Health's COVID-19 response team to identify and provide contact information for any persons exposed by the employee at the workplace.
- c. Provide notice of the exposure to any employees, and contractors (who regularly work at the workplace), who may have been exposed to COVID-19, as stated in the State's COVID-19 Employer Playbook for a Safe Reopening, available at <https://files.covid19.ca.gov/pdf/employer-playbook-for-safe-reopening--en.pdf>.

13. OUTDOOR RECREATION

- a. Each public park and recreation area or facility, shall operate in compliance with the measures set forth in the [State COVID-19 Industry Guidance: Campgrounds, RV Parks and Outdoor Recreation](#). The operator of the park shall prepare a Safe Reopening Plan pursuant to section 11, above, indicating how the park or recreation facility will implement the required measures. Any park or recreation area/facility at which the Protocol requirements cannot be effectively implemented may be required to close.
- b. Outdoor recreation instruction and day camps that comply with the State COVID-19 Industry Guidance: Day Camps, may be conducted in park and recreation areas/facilities.
- c. Recreational boating may occur in compliance with applicable State guidance: <https://files.covid19.ca.gov/pdf/guidance-campgrounds.pdf>.
- d. Outdoor playgrounds may operate in compliance with the State guidance Outdoor

Playgrounds and other Outdoor Recreational Facilities, available at: <https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/Pages/COVID-19/Outdoor%20Playgrounds%20and%20other%20Outdoor%20Recreational%20Facilities.aspx> }.

14. Persons who have been diagnosed with COVID-19, or who are likely to have COVID-19, shall comply with the Order of the Health Officer titled: “Isolation of All Persons with or Likely to have COVID-19”, or as subsequently amended. Persons who have a close contact with a person who either has COVID-19, or is likely to have COVID-19, shall comply with the Order of the Health Officer titled: “Quarantine of Persons Exposed to COVID-19,” or as subsequently amended. Both orders are available at: https://www.sandiegocounty.gov/content/sdc/hhsa/programs/phs/community_epidemiology/dc/2019-nCoV/health-order.html. If a more specific isolation or quarantine order is issued to a person, that order shall be followed.

15. For purposes of this Order:

- a. “Non-essential personnel” are employees, contractors, or members of the public who do not perform treatment, maintenance, support, or administrative tasks deemed essential to the healthcare mission of the long-term care facility or hospital. Non-essential personnel do not include first responders, nor State, federal, or local officials, investigators, or medical personnel carrying out lawful duties. Non-essential personnel do not include visitors to hospitals and long-term care facilities who are granted entry by the facility’s director, or designee, because they are family or friends who are visiting a resident in an end of life or similar situation, are parents or guardians visiting a child who is a patient, or because of any other circumstances deemed appropriate by the facility director, or designee, and where appropriate precautions by the facility that follow federal, State, and local public health guidance regarding COVID-19 are followed.
- b. “Social distancing” is maintaining a six-foot separation from all persons except for household members, first responders and medical providers or employees conducting temperature screenings.

16. This Order is issued as a result of the World Health Organization’s declaration of a worldwide pandemic of COVID-19 disease, also known as “novel coronavirus.”

17. This Order is issued based on scientific evidence regarding the most effective approaches to slow the transmission of communicable diseases generally and COVID-19 specifically, as well

as best practices as currently known and available to protect vulnerable members of the public from avoidable risk of serious illness or death resulting from exposure to COVID-19. The age, condition, and health of a significant portion of the population of the county places it at risk for serious health complications, including death, from COVID-19. Although most individuals who contract COVID-19 do not become seriously ill, persons with mild symptoms and asymptomatic persons with COVID-19 may place other vulnerable members of the public—such as older adults, and those with underlying health conditions—at significant risk.

18. The actions required by this Order are necessary to reduce the number of individuals who will be exposed to COVID-19, and will thereby slow the spread of COVID-19 in the county. By reducing the spread of COVID-19, this Order will help preserve critical and limited healthcare capacity in the county and will save lives.
19. This Order is issued in accordance with, and incorporates by reference: a) the Declaration of Local Health Emergency issued by the Health Officer on February 14, 2020; b) the Proclamation of Local Emergency issued by the County Director of Emergency Services on February 14, 2020; c) the action of the County Board of Supervisors to ratify and continue both the local health emergency and local emergency on February 19, 2020; d) the Proclamation of a State of Emergency issued by the Governor of the State of California on March 4, 2020; e) Executive Order N-25-20 issued by the Governor of the State of California on March 12, 2020 which orders that “All residents are to heed any orders and guidance of state and local health officials, including but not limited to the imposition of social distancing measures, to control COVID-19”; f) Proclamation 9984 regarding COVID-19 issued by the President of the United States on March 11, 2020; g) Executive Order N-33-20 issued by the Governor of the State of California on March 19, 2020; h) the “Interim Additional Guidance for Infection Prevention and Control for Patients with Suspected or Confirmed COVID-19 in Nursing Homes” issued by the CDC; i) COVID-19 guidance issued by the California Department of Public Health on including, but not limited to the Face Coverings Guidance issued on April 1, 2020; j) the State of California’s “Resilience Roadmap,” the State of California’s Plan for Reducing COVID-19 and Adjusting Permitted Sector Activities to Keep Californians Healthy and Safe; and, the California Statewide Public Health Officer Order dated August 28, 2020.
20. This Order is issued to prevent circumstances often present in gatherings that may exacerbate the spread of COVID-19, such as: 1) the increased likelihood that gatherings will attract people from a broad geographic area; 2) the prolonged time period in which large numbers of people are in close proximity; 3) the difficulty in tracing exposure when large numbers of people


attend a single event or are at a single location; and 4) the inability to ensure that such persons follow adequate hygienic practices.

21. This Order is issued to provide additional opportunities for recreational activities while also requiring additional protections from the spread of COVID-19 to the public who are taking advantage of these opportunities for recreational activities. And providing additional protections for employees of essential businesses or reopened business and their customers/clients.
22. This Order is issued to protect the public health as businesses are allowed to reopen by requiring businesses to implement procedures necessary to ensure their employees and customers comply with social distancing, sanitation and screening practices.
23. This Order comes after the release of substantial guidance from the Health Officer, the California Department of Public Health, the CDC, and other public health officials throughout the United States and around the world.
24. The statement of facts and circumstances set forth as justification for each Guidance issued by the California Department of Health Services that is referenced in this Order are hereby accepted and incorporated by reference into this Order.
25. Pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 120175.5 (b) all governmental entities in the county shall take necessary measures within the governmental entity's control to ensure compliance with this Order and to disseminate this Order to venues or locations within the entity's jurisdiction where gatherings may occur.
26. Violation of this Order is subject to fine, imprisonment, or both. (California Health and Safety Code section 120295.)
27. To the extent necessary, this Order may be enforced by the Sheriff or chiefs of police pursuant to Government Code sections 26602 and 41601 and Health and Safety Code section 101029.

28. Once this Order takes effect it shall supersede the Order of the Health Officer and Emergency Regulations dated November 14, 2020.


EMERGENCY REGULATIONS

Any person who violates or who refuses or willfully neglects to obey this regulation is subject to fine, imprisonment, or both. (Government Code section 8665.)

COVID-19 INDUSTRY GUIDANCE: Restaurants

November 24, 2020

This guidance is designed to address sectors and activities opening statewide. However, local health officers may implement more stringent rules tailored to local epidemiological conditions, so employers should also confirm relevant local opening policies.



OVERVIEW

On March 19, 2020, the State Public Health Officer and Director of the California Department of Public Health issued an order requiring most Californians to stay at home to disrupt the spread of COVID-19 among the population.

The impact of COVID-19 on the health of Californians is not yet fully known. Reported illness ranges from very mild (some people have no symptoms) to severe illness that may result in death. Certain groups, including people aged 65 or older and those with serious underlying medical conditions, such as heart or lung disease or diabetes, are at higher risk of hospitalization and serious complications. Transmission is most likely when people are in close contact or in a poorly ventilated area with an infected person, even if that person does not have any symptoms or has not yet developed symptoms.

Precise information about the number and rates of COVID-19 by industry or occupational groups, including among critical infrastructure workers, is not available at this time. There have been multiple outbreaks in a range of workplaces, indicating that workers are at risk of acquiring or transmitting COVID-19 infection. Examples of these workplaces include hospitals, long-term care facilities, prisons, food production, warehouses, meat processing plants, restaurants, and grocery stores.

As stay-at-home orders are modified, it is essential that all possible steps be taken to ensure the safety of workers and the public.

Key prevention practices include:

- ✓ ensuring adequate ventilation in all spaces,
- ✓ physical distancing to the maximum extent possible,
- ✓ use of face coverings by workers (where respiratory protection is not required) and customers/clients,
- ✓ frequent handwashing and regular cleaning and disinfection,
- ✓ training workers on these and other elements of the COVID-19 prevention plan.

In addition, it will be critical to have in place appropriate processes to identify new cases of illness in workplaces and, when they are identified, to intervene quickly and work with public health authorities to halt the spread of the virus.

PURPOSE

This document provides guidance for restaurants to support a safe, clean environment for workers and customers. Businesses must identify and monitor the County Risk Level for the county the business is operating in and make required adjustments to their operations:

- Purple – Widespread – Tier 1: Outdoor operations are permitted and must continue to follow the modifications in this guidance. Performers must maintain physical distancing from spectators and other performers. Performers who are singing, shouting, playing a wind instrument, or engaging in similar activities without a face covering must maintain at least twelve feet of distance from spectators. Additional modifications for performances may be required by the forthcoming Live Performances guidance.
- Red – Substantial – Tier 2: Indoor operations are permitted but must be limited to 25% capacity or 100 people, whichever is fewer, and continue to follow the modifications in this guidance. For indoor performances, performers must wear face coverings at all times and maintain physical distancing from spectators and other performers. Performers are counted toward the occupancy capacity limit. Additional modifications for performances may be required by the forthcoming Live Performances guidance.
- Orange – Moderate – Tier 3: Indoor operations are permitted but must be limited to 50% capacity or 200 people, whichever is fewer, and continue to follow the modifications in this guidance. For indoor performances, performers must wear face coverings and observe all other required modifications consistent with the forthcoming Live Performance guidance. In the interim, performers must wear face coverings at all times and maintain physical distancing from spectators and other performers. Performers are counted toward the occupancy capacity limit.
- Yellow – Minimal – Tier 4: Indoor operations are permitted at 50% capacity and must continue to follow the modifications in this guidance. For indoor performances, performers must wear face coverings and observe all other required modifications consistent with the forthcoming Live Performance guidance. In the interim, performers must wear face coverings at all times and maintain physical distancing from spectators and other performers. Performers are counted toward the occupancy capacity limit.

NOTE: Restaurants should continue to encourage takeout and delivery service whenever possible. Restaurants providing takeout, drive-through pick-up, and delivery may only sell unsealed containers of alcoholic beverages (such as cocktails) when purchased in the same transaction [as a meal](#). A meal is not required for the sale or delivery of alcoholic beverages in manufacturer-sealed containers. Restaurants should

refer to [COVID-19 guidance](#) from the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control. Restaurants may also have other operational aspects and service offerings covered in other guidance, which are available on the [Industry Guidance to Reduce Risk](#) website. Restaurants may not open those operations until permitted by the Blueprint and when doing so must review this guidance to apply the appropriate protocols to all aspects of operations, including:

- Takeout and delivery (Delivery Services guidance)
- Bars and breweries (Bars, Breweries, and Distilleries guidance)
- Wineries and tasting rooms (Wineries and Tasting Rooms guidance)
- Offices (Office guidance)
- Game operations, such as bowling alleys, pool tables, etc. (Family Entertainment Centers guidance)
- Maintenance and custodial work (Limited Services guidance)

This guidance is not intended for concert, performance, or entertainment venues. Those types of establishments should remain closed until they are allowed to resume modified or full operation through a specific reopening order or guidance.

The guidance is not intended to revoke or repeal any worker rights, either statutory, regulatory or collectively bargained, and is not exhaustive, as it does not include county health orders, nor is it a substitute for any existing or newly created safety and health-related regulatory requirements such as those of Cal/OSHA, including a pending [Emergency Temporary Standard](#) expected to go into effect soon.¹ Stay current on changes to public health guidance and state/local orders as the COVID-19 situation continues. Cal/OSHA has more comprehensive guidance on their [Cal/OSHA General Guidelines on Protecting Workers from COVID-19 webpage](#). The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has [guidance for restaurants](#) and the CDC has additional requirements in their [guidance](#) for businesses and employers.

Required Use of Face Coverings

Consult the [CDPH Guidance on the Use of Face Coverings](#), which broadly requires the use of face coverings for both members of the public and workers in all public and workplace settings outside the home. Complete details, including all requirements and exemptions to these rules, can be found in the [guidance, which should be checked periodically for updates.](#)

Workplace Specific Plan

- Establish a written, workplace-specific COVID-19 prevention plan at every location, perform a comprehensive risk assessment of all work areas and work tasks, and designate a person at each establishment to implement the plan.
- Incorporate the [CDPH Face Covering Guidance](#) into the Workplace Specific Plan and include a policy for handling exemptions.
- Identify contact information for the local health department where the restaurant is located for communicating information about COVID-19 outbreaks among workers or customers.
- Train and communicate with workers and worker representatives on the plan and make the plan available to workers and their representatives.
- Regularly evaluate the establishment for compliance with the plan and document and correct deficiencies identified.
- Investigate any COVID-19 illness and determine if any work-related factors could have contributed to risk of infection. Update the plan as needed to prevent further cases.
- Implement the necessary processes and protocols when a workplace has an outbreak, in accordance with [CDPH guidelines](#) and orders or guidance from the local health department.
- Identify close contacts (within six feet for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period) of an infected person and take steps to isolate COVID-19 positive worker(s) and close contacts.
- Notify all employees in writing, and employers of subcontracted employees, who may have been exposed to COVID-19 and report workplace outbreaks to the local health department. For additional information on employer responsibilities under [AB 685](#) (Chapter 84, Statutes of 2020), refer to the [Enhanced Enforcement and Employer Reporting Requirements](#) from Cal/OSHA and the [Employer Questions about AB 685](#) from CDPH.
- For outdoor operations: Establish an effective heat illness prevention plan with written procedures in both English and the language understood by the majority of the employees. The plan must be available to employees at the worksite. See the [Cal/OSHA heat illness prevention page](#) for resources, including FAQs, a webinar, and a sample written plan. Elements of a heat illness prevent plan must include:
 - Access to potable drinking water

- Access to shade
- Cool down breaks
- Emergency procedures for heat illness cases
- High heat procedures when the temperature exceeds 95 degrees
- Monitoring of employees who are acclimatizing during a heat wave
- Training on heat illness prevention and symptoms
- Adhere to the guidelines below. Failure to do so could result in workplace illnesses that may cause operations to be temporarily closed or limited.



Topics for Worker Training

- Information on [COVID-19](#), how to prevent it from spreading, and which [people are at higher risk](#) for severe illness or death.
- Self-screening at home, including temperature and/or symptom checks using [CDC guidelines](#).
- The importance of not coming to work:
 - If a worker has symptoms of COVID-19 as [described by the CDC](#), such as a fever or chills, cough, shortness of breath or difficulty breathing, fatigue, muscle or body aches, headache, new loss of taste or smell, sore throat, congestion or runny nose, nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea, OR
 - If a worker was diagnosed with COVID-19 and has not yet been released from isolation, OR
 - If, within the past 14 days, a worker has had contact with someone who has been diagnosed with COVID-19 and is considered potentially infectious (i.e. still on isolation).
- To return to work after a worker receives a COVID-19 diagnosis only after meeting [CDPH Guidance on Returning to Work or School Following COVID-19 Diagnosis](#).
- To seek medical attention if their symptoms become severe, including persistent pain or pressure in the chest, confusion, or bluish lips or face. Updates and further details are available on [CDC's webpage](#).
- The importance of frequent handwashing with soap and water, including scrubbing with soap for 20 seconds (or using hand sanitizer with at least 60% ethanol or 70% isopropanol when workers cannot get to a sink or handwashing station, per [CDC guidelines](#)). Never use hand sanitizers with [methanol](#) due to its high toxicity to both children and adults.

- The importance of physical distancing, both at work and off work time (see Physical Distancing section below).
- Proper use of face coverings, including:
 - Face coverings provide some protection to the wearer but are not designed to meet standards for filtering virus-containing particles.
 - Face coverings do not replace the need for physical distancing and frequent handwashing.
 - Face coverings must cover the nose and mouth.
 - Workers should wash or sanitize hands before and after using or adjusting face coverings.
 - Avoid touching the eyes, nose, and mouth.
 - Face coverings must not be shared and should be washed or discarded after each shift.
- Information contained in the [CDPH Face Covering Guidance](#), which mandates the circumstances in which face coverings must be worn and the exemptions, as well as any policies, work rules, and practices the employer has adopted to ensure the use of face coverings. Training should also include the employer's policies on how people who are exempted from wearing a face covering will be handled.
- Ensure any independent contractors, temporary or contract workers, and volunteers at the facility are also properly trained in COVID-19 prevention policies and have necessary supplies and PPE. Discuss these responsibilities ahead of time with organizations supplying temporary and/or contract workers.
- Information on paid leave benefits the worker may be entitled to receive that would make it financially easier to stay at home. See additional information on [government programs supporting sick leave and workers' compensation for COVID-19](#), including workers' sick leave rights under the [Families First Coronavirus Response Act](#).



Individual Control Measures and Screening

- Provide temperature and/or symptom screenings for all workers at the beginning of their shift and any vendors, contractors, or other workers entering the establishment. Make sure the temperature/symptom screener avoids close contact with workers to the extent possible.
- If requiring self-screening at home, which is an appropriate alternative to providing it at the establishment, ensure that screening was performed prior to the worker leaving the home for their shift and follows [CDC guidelines](#), as described in the Topics for Worker Training section above.
- Encourage workers who are sick or exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19 to stay home.
- Employers must provide and ensure workers use all required protective equipment, including face coverings and gloves where necessary.
- Employers should consider where disposable glove use may be helpful to supplement frequent handwashing or use of hand sanitizer; examples are for workers who are screening others for symptoms or handling commonly touched items. Workers should wear gloves when handling items contaminated by body fluids.
- Servers, bussers, and other workers moving items used by customers (dirty cups, plates, napkins, etc.) or handling trash bags should use disposable gloves (and wash hands before putting them on and after removing them) and provide aprons and change frequently.
- Dishwashers should use equipment to protect the eyes, nose, and mouth from contaminant splash using protective glasses, goggles, or a face shield in addition to a face covering. Dishwashers must be provided impermeable aprons and change frequently. Reusable protective equipment, such as shields and glasses, should be properly disinfected between uses.
- Employers must ensure workers maintain six feet of distance from others whenever possible. When it is not possible, the length and frequency of interaction should be kept to a minimum. Where job duties require regular interaction (e.g. wait staff), employers should offer a secondary barrier (i.e. face shields or safety goggles) for use by workers who wish to use one and permit workers to use their own if they prefer.
- Employers must take reasonable measures, including public address announcements, posting signage in strategic and highly-visible locations, and in reservation confirmations, to remind the public that they must use face coverings whenever not eating or drinking (unless exempted per

the [CDPH Face Covering Guidance](#)), practice physical distancing, not touch their face, frequently wash their hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, and use hand sanitizer.

- Remind guests in advance to bring a face covering and make them available to anyone who arrives without one, otherwise they should not be allowed to enter the premises (unless exempted per the [CDPH Face Covering Guidance](#)).
- Guests should be temperature and/or symptom screened upon arrival, asked to use hand sanitizer, and must bring and wear a face covering when not eating or drinking if not exempted per the [CDPH Face Covering Guidance](#). Employers have the right to cancel reservations for individuals/parties with symptomatic guests and refuse entry.
- Display a set of clearly visible rules for customers and restaurant personnel at the restaurant entrance(s) that are to be a condition of entry. The rules could include instructions to use hand sanitizer, maintain physical distance from other customers, avoid unnecessary touching of restaurant surfaces, contact information for the local health department, and changes to restaurant services. Whenever possible, the rules should be available digitally, include pictograms, and included on/with menus.



Ventilation, Cleaning, and Disinfecting Protocols

- Restaurants should increase fresh air circulation by opening windows or doors, if possible, and in accordance with security and safety protocols.
- Position tables indoors near windows and doors to maximize air exchange and ventilation but avoid having air flow from where one party is seated directly toward another party.
- For indoor locations, maximize the amount of outdoor air supplied by ventilation systems. Install the highest efficiency filters compatible with the ventilation system.
- Where possible, install portable high-efficiency air cleaners, upgrade the building's air filters to the highest efficiency possible, and make other modifications to increase the quantity of outside air and ventilation in all working areas.
- Check the [CDPH website](#) periodically for updates on indoor air quality and ventilation guidance for airborne diseases in indoor settings.

- Perform thorough cleaning in high traffic areas, such as customer waiting areas and lobbies, break rooms, lunch areas and areas of ingress and egress including host stands, entry ways, stairways, stairwells, escalators, handrails, and elevator controls. Frequently disinfect commonly used surfaces including doors, door handles, crash bars, light switches, waiting area chairs, credit card terminals, ATM PIN pads, receipt trays, bus tubs, serving trays, phones, toilets, and handwashing facilities.
- Frequently clean items touched by patrons, especially those that might attract contact from children including candy and toy vending machines, display cases, decorative fountains, etc.
- Clean touchable surfaces between shifts or between users, whichever is more frequent, including but not limited to working surfaces, phones, registers, touchpads/touchscreens, tablets, timeclocks, appliances, kitchen and bar utensils and implements, oven doors, grill and range knobs, carts and trolleys, keys, etc.
- Avoid sharing audio equipment, phones, tablets, laptops, desks, pens, and other work supplies wherever possible. Never share PPE.
- Discontinue shared use of audio headsets and other equipment between workers unless the equipment can be properly disinfected after use. Consult equipment manufacturers to determine appropriate disinfection steps, particularly for soft, porous surfaces such as foam earmuffs.
- Provide time for workers to implement cleaning practices during their shift. Assign cleaning assignments during working hours as part of the employee's job duties. Procure options for third-party cleaning companies to assist with the increased cleaning demand, as needed.
- Procure options for third-party cleaning companies to assist with the increased cleaning demand, as needed.
- Equip spaces such as dining rooms, bar areas, host stands, and kitchens with proper sanitation products, including hand sanitizer and sanitizing wipes to all staff directly assisting customers.
- Ensure that sanitary facilities stay operational and stocked at all times and provide additional soap, paper towels, and hand sanitizer when needed.
- When choosing disinfecting chemicals, use products approved for use against COVID-19 on the [Environmental Protection Agency \(EPA\)-approved](#) list and follow product instructions. Use disinfectants labeled to be effective against emerging viral pathogens, diluted household bleach solutions (5 tablespoons per gallon of water), or alcohol solutions with at least 70% alcohol that are appropriate for the surface. Provide workers training on the chemical hazards, manufacturer's directions, ventilation

requirements, and Cal/OSHA requirements for safe use. Workers using cleaners or disinfectants must wear gloves and other protective equipment as required by the product instructions. Follow the [asthma-safer cleaning methods](#) recommended by the California Department of Public Health and ensure proper ventilation.

- Continue to follow existing codes regarding requirements for sanitizing (rather than disinfecting) food contact surfaces.
- To minimize the risk of [Legionnaires' disease](#) and other diseases associated with water, [take steps](#) to ensure that all water systems and features are safe to use after a prolonged facility shutdown.
- Where possible, do not clean floors by sweeping or other methods that can disperse pathogens into the air unless all persons in the area have appropriate PPE. Use a vacuum with a HEPA filter wherever possible.
- Provide disposable menus to guests and make menus available digitally so that customers can view on a personal electronic device, if possible. If disposable menus cannot be provided, properly disinfect menus before and after customer use. Consider options for customers to order ahead of time.
- Discontinue pre-setting tables with napkins, cutlery, glassware, food ware, etc. These should be supplied individually to customers as needed. Do not leave card stands, flyers, napkin holders, or other items on tables.
- Suspend use of shared food items such as condiment bottles, salt and pepper shakers, etc. and provide these foods in single serve containers, if possible. Where this is not possible, shared items such as condiment bottles, shakers, etc., should be supplied as needed to customers and disinfected after each use.
- Pre-roll utensils in napkins prior to use by customers. Workers must wash hands before pre-rolling utensils in napkins. The pre-roll should then be stored in a clean container. After customers are seated, the pre-roll should be put on the table by a worker who recently washed their hands.
- Reusable customer items including utensils, food ware, breadbaskets, etc., must be properly washed, rinsed, and sanitized. Cleaned flatware, stemware, dishware, etc., must be properly stored away from customers and personnel until ready for use. Use disposable items if proper cleaning of reusable items is infeasible.
- Takeout containers for leftovers must be filled by customers and available only upon request.
- Dirty linens used at dining tables such as tablecloths and napkins should be removed after each customer use and transported from dining areas in sealed bags. Workers should wear gloves when handling dirty linens.

- Thoroughly clean each customer dining location after every use. This will include disinfecting tables, chairs, booster seats, highchairs, booths, etc. and allowing adequate time for proper disinfection, following product instructions. Many EPA-approved disinfectants require minimal contact time (seconds to one minute) against human coronavirus.
- Close areas where customers may congregate or touch food or food ware items that other guests may use. Modify delivery of these items by providing items to guests individually, converting to cafeteria-style service, etc. Discard or clean, disinfect, or sanitize shared items after each use, as appropriate. The areas that should be closed include but are not limited to:
 - Self-service areas with condiment caddies, utensil caddies, napkins, lids, straws, water pitchers, to-go containers, etc.
 - Self-service machines including ice, soda, frozen yogurt dispensers, etc.
 - Self-service food areas such as buffets, salsa bars, salad bars, etc.
- Discontinue tableside food preparation, e.g. guacamole preparation, and presentation of uncovered food items on selection carts and conveyor belts. Carts and conveyor belts can be used only if the food is fully covered in covers that are adequately cleaned and disinfected after each use or are disposable and immediately discarded after use.
- Do not leave out after-meal mints, candies, snacks, or toothpicks for customers. Offer them with the check or provide only on request.
- Install hand sanitizer dispensers, touchless if possible, at guest and worker entrances and contact areas such as driveways, reception areas, in dining rooms, near elevator landings, etc.



Physical Distancing Guidelines

- **WARNING:** physical distancing alone is insufficient to prevent transmission of COVID-19.
- Prioritize outdoor seating and curbside pickup to minimize cross flow of customers in enclosed environments. Restaurants can expand their outdoor seating, and alcohol offerings in those areas, if they comply with local laws and regulations.
- Provide takeout, delivery, and drive through options for customers when possible. Takeout items should be made available using contactless pick-up and delivery protocols.

- Eliminate person-to-person contact for delivery of goods whenever possible. Designate drop-off locations to receive deliveries away from high traffic areas. Maintain physical distance of at least six feet with delivery drivers.
- Encourage reservations to allow for time to disinfect restaurant areas and provide guidance via digital platforms, if possible, to customers for physical distancing while at the restaurant.
- Consider allowing dine-in customers to order ahead of time to limit the amount of time spent in the establishment. Ask customers to wait in their cars or away from the establishment while waiting to be seated. If possible, alert patrons through their mobile phones when their table is ready to avoid touching and use of “buzzers.”
- Indoor and outdoor dining service tables must be at least six feet apart, measured from the back of the chair at one table to the back of the chair at the adjacent table while diners are seated. Maximize the distance between indoor service tables beyond the required six feet wherever possible, to minimize the risks from customers eating indoors without face coverings.
- Limit the number of patrons at a single table to a household unit or patrons who have asked to be seated together. People in the same party seated at the same table do not have to be six feet apart. All members of the party must be present before seating and hosts must bring the entire party to the table at one time.
- Implement measures to ensure physical distancing of at least six feet between workers and customers. This can include use of physical partitions or visual cues (e.g., floor markings or signs to indicate to where workers and/or guests should stand).
- Install physical barriers or partitions at cash registers, bars, host stands, and other areas where maintaining physical distance of six feet is difficult.
- Any area where guests or workers queue should also be clearly marked for appropriate physical distancing. This includes check-stands and terminals, deli counters and lines, restrooms, elevator lobbies, host stands and waiting areas, valet drop off and pickup, and any other area where customers congregate.
- Physical distancing protocols should be used in any office areas, kitchens, pantries, walk-in freezers, or other high-density, high-traffic work areas, where possible.
- Worker pre-shift meetings and trainings should be conducted virtually or in areas that allow for appropriate physical distancing between workers. Food, beverages, food ware, etc., must not be shared.

- Stagger worker breaks, in compliance with wage and hour regulations, to maintain physical distancing protocols.
- Consider offering workers who request modified duties options that minimize their contact with customers and other workers (e.g., managing inventory rather than working as a cashier or managing administrative needs through telework).
- Reconfigure office spaces, lobbies, beverage bars, kitchens and workstations, host stand areas, and other spaces wherever possible to allow for at least six feet of distance between people dining, working, and passing through areas for entry and exit.
- Remove tables and chairs from dining areas so that six feet of physical distance can be maintained for customers and workers. If tables, chairs, booths, etc., cannot be moved, use visual cues to show that they are not available for use.
- Discontinue seating of customers where customers cannot maintain six feet of distance from workers, work areas, and food and drink preparation areas.
- Limit the number of workers serving individual parties, in compliance with wage and hour regulations.
- All restaurant workers should minimize the amount of time spent within six feet of guests.
- Ensure workers can maintain physical distance in breakrooms, using barriers, increasing distance between tables/chairs to separate workers, etc. Where possible, create outdoor break areas with shade coverings and seating arrangements that ensures physical distancing. Discourage workers from congregating during breaks and ensure they are not eating or drinking without face coverings within six feet of each other.
- Reconfigure kitchens to maintain physical distancing in those areas where practical and, if not practical, stagger shifts, if possible, to do work ahead of time.
- Discourage food preparation workers from changing or entering others' workstations during shifts.
- Discourage people from congregating in high traffic areas such as bathrooms, hallways, bar areas, reservation and credit card terminals, etc.
- Establish directional hallways and passageways for foot traffic, if possible, to eliminate workers from passing by one another.
- Require workers to not use handshakes, fist or elbow bumps, hugs, and similar greetings or other behaviors that break physical distance.

- Guests should enter through doors that are propped open or automated, if possible. Hand sanitizer should be available for guests who must touch door handles.
- Adjust music volume so that workers can maintain distance from customers to hear orders and people can avoid speaking loudly or shouting.
- Implement peak period queueing procedures, including a host to remind guests to queue with at least six feet of distance between parties outside or in waiting areas.
- Avoid touching others' pens and clipboards. If possible, install transfer-aiding materials, such as shelving and bulletin boards, to reduce person-to-person hand-offs.

¹Additional requirements must be considered for vulnerable populations. Restaurants must comply with all [Cal/OSHA](#) standards and be prepared to adhere to its guidance as well as guidance from the [Centers for Disease Control and Prevention \(CDC\)](#) and the [California Department of Public Health \(CDPH\)](#). Additionally, employers should be prepared to alter their operations as those guidelines change.

Subject: Notice of Violation letter for Nude Entertainment Business Permit #2010022137

This letter is to provide information regarding the operating requirements for nude entertainment businesses.

In September 2020, the San Diego Police Department, Vice Unit, conducted covert inspections at your business, Pacers, located at 3334 Midway Drive, San Diego, CA 92110. During the covert inspections, the business was in violation of a San Diego Municipal Code section and a Government Code section.

During the inspections, the undercover detective was inside of the business for approximately 45 minutes. The detective observed adult entertainers that danced topless on the main stage. The detective also observed several adult entertainers sitting down next to male clientele inside the establishment.

These actions are in violation of San Diego Municipal Code section 33.0403(a)(1) and Government Code section 8665, which state in part:

§33.0403 Regulatory Penalties

- (a) In addition to any other penalties provided by law, any *permittee* who does any of the following is subject to regulatory action by the *Chief of Police* against his or her *police permit*:
- (1) Violates or allows the *violation* of any section of this Article, any law or regulation pertaining to the business, or violates any condition imposed on the *permit*;

Any person who violates any of the provisions of this chapter or who refuses or willfully neglects to obey any lawful order or regulation promulgated or issued as provided in this chapter, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction thereof, shall be punishable by a fine of not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) or by imprisonment for not to exceed six months or by both such fine and imprisonment.

On March 13, 2020 the County of San Diego issued a Health Officer Order and Emergency Regulations as a result of the World Health Organization's declaration of a worldwide pandemic of COVID-19 disease, also known as "novel coronavirus." The order was issued based on scientific evidence regarding the most effective approaches to slow the transmission of communicable diseases generally and COVID-19 specifically, as well as best practices as currently known and available to protect vulnerable members of the public from avoidable risk of serious illness or death resulting from exposure to COVID-19.

This order was amended on September 1, 2020, September 10, 2020, and September 25, 2020, but none of these amendments permitted the reopening of the Nude Entertainment industry.

During the inspections, the undercover detective was inside of the business for approximately 45 minutes. The detective observed adult entertainers that danced topless on the main stage. The detective also observed several adult entertainers sitting down next to male clientele inside the establishment.







On July 13, 2020, by Order of the California Health Officer, offices for non-critical infrastructure sectors were closed (<https://www.cdph.ca.gov/Programs/CID/DCDC/CDPH%20Document%20Library/COVID-19/SHO%20Order%20Dimming%20Entire%20State%207-13-2020.pdf>). AT&T employees are generally part of the essential workforce for the communications infrastructure. However, employees identified in critical infrastructure are only part of the essential workforce “if remote working is not practical” (<https://files.covid19.ca.gov/pdf/EssentialCriticalInfrastructureWorkers.pdf>).

I am in receipt of an advertisement for an "election night watch party" at the Legacy International Resort and Spa this evening from 7 p.m. to 11 p.m. The event advertises:

- Networking
- A cash bar
- A cost of \$25 per person
- Hotel rooms at \$99/night
- On-site parking at \$10
- Optional dinner at Theresa's Italian Steakhouse

At least 500 people are expected to attend this party and that it will be held both indoors and outdoors. Although this event is alternatively referred to as a peaceful protest, it is advertised as, and has the components of, a private catered party.

As you are aware, bars are not permitted. Alcohol may only be served in restaurants with full meal service. Restaurants must comply with State and local health orders, and applicable industry guidance issued by the California Department of Public Health and CalOSHA. Currently, restaurants such as Theresa's Italian Steakhouse may be open at 25% indoor capacity. *COVID-19 INDUSTRY GUIDANCE: Restaurants, Bars, and Wineries* states: "All events or gatherings that would bring together persons from different households, such as private parties, must be cancelled or postponed until further notice."

If a political protest is held—without food or beverage service—it must be in conformance with State guidance. The following are applicable guidelines from the California Department of Public Health:

- In-person protests and rallies present special public health concerns for high risk of COVID-19 transmission.


- Even with adherence to physical distancing, bringing members of different households together to engage in in-person protests and rallies carries an especially high risk of widespread transmission of COVID-19.
- People engaging in these activities must wear face coverings at all times.
- Persons in attendance must maintain a physical distance of at least 6 feet between persons or groups of persons from different households at all times.
- State public health directives do not prohibit in-person indoor protests and rallies as long as (1) attendance is limited to 25% capacity, (2) physical distancing of at least 6 feet between persons or groups of persons from different households is maintained at all times, and (3) singing and chanting activities are discontinued. Face coverings must be worn at all times.

In addition, as a hotel you must comply with “*COVID-19 INDUSTRY GUIDANCE: Hotels, Lodging, and Short-Term Rentals.*” As such, this guidance states that “meeting venues, banquet halls, or convention centers must keep those establishments closed until allowed to resume modified or full operation.”

The California Department of Public Health and CalOSHA has issued this guidance not only for the health and safety of your guests, but for the safety of your employees, and the community at large.

I appreciate the impact these restrictions have on your business. However, as the responsible party for your facility, it is your duty to ensure that the Orders’ are complied with. If you do not comply, necessary actions will be taken to enforce the Orders. Failure to comply may result in criminal misdemeanor citations with a \$1,000 fine for *each* violation. In addition, if violations continue, I may issue an order closing this establishment.



COVID Clinic has also failed to comply with the requirement of both the California Code of Regulations, and the Health Officer Order and Emergency Regulations, to submit test results to the Public Health Officer. Based on COVID Clinic's failure to provide proof that it is complying with State law despite numerous requests from the County, and after consultation with the California Department of Public Health, we have concerns that COVID Clinic's testing process is not complying with State law and therefore may not be producing reliable and verifiable results. Numerous people have paid for the tests at your campus and are presumably relying on the veracity of the tests. Public reliance on such test results, and the failure of COVID Clinic to report such tests, may exacerbate the spread of COVID-19, and due to the severity of the pandemic this places the public's health at risk.

Therefore pursuant to California Health and Safety Code section 120175.5 (b), you are ordered to cease the operation of testing services by COVID Clinic on your campus, unless and until COVID Clinic is able to provide us with satisfactory evidence of compliance with State law.

ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER (Closure of El Prez)

Pursuant to Executive Order N-33-20 issued by the Governor of the State of California, and by Order of the State Health Officer ("Stay-at-Home Order"), all individuals living in the State of California are to stay at home or in their place of residence except as needed to maintain the continuity of operations of the federal critical infrastructure sectors.

On May 7, 2020, the State Health Officer then set out California's path forward from this Stay-at-Home Order in California's Pandemic Roadmap. That Roadmap identifies four stages of the pandemic: safety and preparation (Stage 1), reopening of lower-risk workplaces and other spaces (Stage 2), reopening of higher-risk workplaces and other spaces (Stage 3), and finally an easing of final restrictions leading to the end of the stay at home order (Stage 4). San Diego County is currently in Stage 2 of the Roadmap under a variance issued by the California Department of Public Health on May 21, 2020—which allows in-person dining.

Under the Health Officer Order and Emergency Regulations in effect in the County of San Diego all reopened businesses shall implement the Safe Reopening Plan or COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol and provide evidence of its implementation to any authority enforcing this Order upon demand. The Safe Reopening Plan or COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol must ensure all required measures are implemented. Any business that fails to comply with its Safe Reopening Plan or COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol may be required to close.

All restaurants in San Diego, including the El Prez, were authorized to reopen in-person dining on May 21, 2020. Upon reopening, the El Prez did not effectively implement a COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol to ensuring social distancing and sanitation, and is in violation of Health Officer Order and Emergency Regulations. The failure to safely operate in-person dining at the El Prez is an imminent health and safety risk.

Pursuant to California Health and Safety Code sections 101040, 120175, and 120175.5 (b) the Health Officer of the County of San Diego (Health Officer) **ORDERS AS FOLLOWS:**

1. **The El Prez restaurant located at 4190 Mission Blvd, San Diego, California shall be immediately closed.**

2. In order to reopen to the public the owner/operator shall prepare a revised COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Plan and submit it to the Health Officer. Upon review of a revised Plan, the Health Officer may rescind this Order if it can be shown that social distancing and sanitation standards can be followed in El Prez.
3. The City of San Diego shall take all appropriate measures to ensure compliance with this Order.
4. Violation of this Order is subject to fine, imprisonment, or both. (California Health and Safety Code section 120295.)
5. To the extent necessary, this Order may be enforced by the Sheriff or chiefs of police pursuant to Government Code sections 26602 and 41601 and Health and Safety Code section 101029.

ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER (Immediate Closure of Hernandez Hideaway)

Pursuant to Executive Order N-33-20 issued by the Governor of the State of California, and by Order of the State Health Officer ("Stay-at-Home Order"), all individuals living in the State of California are to stay at home or in their place of residence except as needed to maintain the continuity of operations of the federal critical infrastructure sectors.

On May 7, 2020, the State Health Officer then set out California's path forward from this Stay-at-Home Order in California's Pandemic Roadmap. That Roadmap identifies four stages of the pandemic: safety and preparation (Stage 1), reopening of lower-risk workplaces and other spaces (Stage 2), reopening of higher-risk workplaces and other spaces (Stage 3), and finally an easing of final restrictions leading to the end of the stay at home order (Stage 4). San Diego County is currently in Stage 3 of the Roadmap under a variance issued by the California Department of Public Health on May 21, 2020—which allows in-person dining.

Under the Health Officer Order and Emergency Regulations in effect in the County of San Diego all reopened businesses shall implement the Safe Reopening Plan or COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol and provide evidence of its implementation to any authority enforcing this Order upon demand. The Safe Reopening Plan or COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol must ensure all required measures are implemented. Any business that fails to comply with its Safe Reopening Plan or COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol may be required to close.

All restaurants in San Diego, including the Hernandez Hideaway, were authorized to reopen in-person dining on May 21, 2020. Upon reopening, the Hernandez Hideaway did not effectively implement a COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Protocol to ensure social distancing and sanitation, and is in violation of Health Officer Order and Emergency Regulations. The relevant facts are as follows:

1. On May 29, 2020, the County of San Diego Department of Environmental Health (DEH) conducted a status verification inspection and determined that social distancing and sanitation protocols were not in place, nor were employees wearing face coverings. DEH staff addressed this while on site with the employees and Owner of the facility, Rick Stevens.

2. On June 12 and 21, 2020, the County of San Diego Sheriff's Department went out to Hernandez Hideaway and have observed restaurant, have attempted to elicit voluntary compliance from the facility, and have observed staff not wearing face coverings.
3. On June 23, 2020, Sheriff's Department communicated with the restaurant in response to a complaint regarding staff not wearing face coverings to try to elicit compliance with Health Order requiring facial covering.
4. On June 23, 2020, DEH responded to a complaint for Hernandez Hideaway and contacted Mr. Rick Stevens to address the complaint and again provide education on the Health Order and state guidelines. Mr. Stevens admitted that he was not compliant and stated he will continue to operate without these COVID preventative measures and will not require staff to wear face coverings.


Despite County efforts to educate and enforce the health officer's order, the Hernandez Hideaway's failure to safely operate in-person dining at the Hernandez Hideaway is an imminent health and safety risk and an imminent health hazard.

Pursuant to California Health and Safety Code sections 101040, 120175, and 120175.5 (b) the Health Officer of the County of San Diego (Health Officer) **ORDERS AS FOLLOWS:**

1. **The Hernandez Hideaway restaurant located at 19320 Lake Drive, Escondido, California shall be immediately closed.**
2. In order to reopen to the public the owner/operator shall prepare a revised COVID-19 Restaurant Operating Plan and submit it to the Health Officer. Upon review of a revised Plan, the Health Officer may rescind this Order if it can be shown that social distancing and sanitation standards will be followed in Hernandez Hideaway.
3. This Order shall be posted at the entrance of the building.
4. Violation of this Order is subject to fine, imprisonment, or both. (California Health and Safety Code section 120295.)
5. This Order may be enforced by the Sheriff pursuant to Government Code sections 26602 and 41601 and Health and Safety Code section 101029.

ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER (Immediate Closure of "The Gym")

Pursuant to the Order of the California State Health Officer on July 13, 2020, and as incorporated by the Health Officer Order and Emergency Regulations in effect throughout San Diego County, gyms and fitness centers must close all indoor operations. Gyms and fitness centers may legally operate outdoors pursuant to the State and local health orders.

On July 1, 2020, the California Department of Public Health, in conjunction with Cal/OSHA, issued COVID-19 Industry Guidance: Fitness Centers which sets forth the method in which gyms and fitness centers may operate which includes requirements for wearing face coverings and social distancing.

"The Gym" located at 2949 Garnett Avenue, which also may be known as The Pacific Beach Fitness, Inc., or Viking Express L.P. is owned/operated by Ritchard Wayne Stephenson (also known as Rick Stephenson), and Ed Schoenborn. The Gym has continued to conduct indoor operations in violation of State and local health orders. Patrons of the Gym are not wearing face coverings or social distancing and the owners/operators of the Gym do not appear to be enforcing this requirement.

The San Diego Police Department has attempted to elicit voluntary compliance by the owners/operators of the Gym. According to the San Diego Police Department, the owners/operators of the Gym have acknowledged that they are aware of the Public Health Orders but will not voluntarily comply.

Despite efforts to educate and enforce State and local law at this property, the Gym's failure to safely operate is an imminent health and safety risk and an imminent health hazard.


Pursuant to California Health and Safety Code sections 101040, 120175, and 120175.5 (b) the Health Officer of the County of San Diego (Health Officer) **ORDERS AS FOLLOWS:**

1. **The Gym located at 2949 Garnett Avenue shall immediately close.**
2. The Gym may reopen under the following conditions:

- a. All fitness activities are conducted outdoors in compliance with State and local health officer orders and Industry Guidance.
 - b. Submission of a revised COVID-19 Reopening Plan to the Health Officer. Upon review of a revised Plan, the Health Officer may rescind this Order if it can be shown that social distancing and sanitation standards will be followed outdoors.
3. This Order shall be posted at the entrance of the building. All owners, operators, managers, employees, and patrons who knowingly operate, assist in the operation, or use this facility in violation of this Order shall be in violation.
4. A copy of this Order shall be provided to Cal/OSHA.
5. Violation of this Order is subject to fine, imprisonment, or both. (California Health and Safety Code section 120295.)
6. Pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 120175.5 (b) the City of San Diego shall take all available measures within the City's control to ensure compliance with this Order in order to control the spread of the COVID-19.
7. This Order may be enforced by the San Diego Police Department pursuant to Government Code sections 26602 and 41601 and Health and Safety Code section 101029.

ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER (Immediate Closure of Metroflex Gym)

Pursuant to the Order of the California Public Health Officer, on July 13, 2020, and as incorporated by the Health Officer Order and Emergency Regulations, in effect throughout San Diego County, gyms and fitness centers must close all indoor operations. Gyms and fitness centers may legally operate outdoors pursuant to the State and local health orders. Per the California Public Health Officer: "Outdoor operations may be conducted under a tent, canopy, or other sun shelter but only as long as no more than one side is closed, allowing sufficient outdoor air movement."

On July 1, 2020 (updated on July 29, 2020), the California Department of Public Health, in conjunction with Cal/OSHA, issued *COVID-19 Industry Guidance: Fitness Centers* which sets forth the method in which gyms and fitness centers may operate which includes requirements for wearing face coverings and social distancing.

Metroflex Gym LLC ("Metroflex Gym") is a gym and fitness center located 318 North Horne Street in Oceanside operated by Gavin Louis Uridel, President/CEO, and also consists of the following LLC managers/members: Josh Barnett of Phoenix, Arizona, and Jimmy Anklesaria of Del Mar, California, as co-trustee of the Jimmy Anklesaria and Jennifer L. Anklesaria Family Trust.

Metroflex Gym is currently operating indoors in violation of State and local health orders.

The Oceanside Police Department has attempted to elicit voluntary compliance from the President/CEO of the Metroflex Gym and has previously issued a misdemeanor citation to him for violation of State and local health orders at related to COVID-19 at the Metroflex Gym. Despite efforts to educate and enforce State and local law at this property, Metroflex Gym is currently in non-compliance and the failure to safely operate is an imminent health and safety risk.



ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER (Immediate Closure of Boulevard Fitness)

Pursuant to the Order of the California Public Health Officer, on July 13, 2020, and as incorporated by the Health Officer Order and Emergency Regulations, in effect throughout San Diego County, gyms and fitness centers must close all indoor operations. Gyms and fitness centers may legally operate outdoors pursuant to the State and local health orders. Per the California Public Health Officer: "Outdoor operations may be conducted under a tent, canopy, or other sun shelter but only as long as no more than one side is closed, allowing sufficient outdoor air movement."

On July 1, 2020 (updated on July 29, 2020), the California Department of Public Health, in conjunction with Cal/OSHA, issued *COVID-19 Industry Guidance: Fitness Centers* which sets forth the method in which gyms and fitness centers may operate, and includes requirements for wearing face coverings and social distancing.

Boulevard Fitness LLC ("Boulevard Fitness") is a gym and fitness center located at 2110 El Cajon Blvd in San Diego and is operated by Shawn Gilbert, CEO. Since the July 13, 2020 order closing indoor operations at gyms and fitness centers, and continuing to the present day, Boulevard Fitness has operated indoors in violation of law. On July 21, 2020, the Health Officer issued a cease and desist order that was delivered to Boulevard Fitness.

On July 30, 2020, the San Diego Police Department conducted an inspection of Boulevard Fitness and noted approximately 25 patrons using the facility. Many were not social distancing or wearing masks. Shawn Gilbert was present and acknowledged receipt of the cease and desist order.

Subsequent to this inspection, Boulevard Fitness prepared an updated Safe Reopening Plan for submission to the Health Officer. An inspection by the County was made on August 5, 2020 to review the updated Safe Reopening Plan and determine whether updated plan is compliant with State and local health orders. During the inspection it was noted that the gym was still operating indoors, and Shawn Gilbert acknowledged that there was no plan to operate outdoors. Despite repeated efforts to educate and enforce State and local law at this property, Boulevard Fitness is currently in non-compliance and the failure to safely operate is an imminent health and safety risk.



ORDER OF THE HEALTH OFFICER (Immediate Closure of Bay Bridge Brewing)

Pursuant to the Order of the California Public Health Officer issued on August 28, 2020, and as incorporated by the Health Officer Order and Emergency Regulations in effect throughout San Diego County, restaurants may operate in compliance with applicable industry guidance. Based on the current tier status in San Diego County, restaurants may operate in-person dining, and may operate indoors at 25% capacity.

The current *COVID-19 Industry Guidance: Dine-In Restaurants*, published by the California Department of Public Health and CalOSHA, states in part that restaurants must discontinue live entertainment, tables must be at least 6 feet apart, employees must wear face coverings, and customers must wear face coverings except when seated at their table.

Bay Bridge Brewing, Inc. ("Bay Bridge Brewing") is a restaurant located at 688 Marsat Ct., Suite B, in Chula Vista, California, and is operated by Douglas K. Chase and James R. Shirey.

On September 29, 2020, the Health Officer issued a cease and desist notice that was delivered to Bay Bridge Brewing. The cease and desist notice stated that Bay Bridge Brewing was documented to be in violation of the Order of the State Health Officer and the County Order of the Health Officer and Emergency Regulations by not operating in compliance with applicable industry guidance. Specifically, live entertainment regularly occurs at Bay Bridge Brewing, tables are less than six feet apart, and employees and customers do not wear face coverings when required to do so. The cease and desist notice stated that failure to comply may result in criminal citations and further violations may result in an order to close the restaurant.

On October 2, 2020, a County representative visited Bay Bridge Brewing and observed a live comedy show occurring. The County representative spoke with Mr. Shirley who acknowledged that he was in possession of the cease and desist notice and did not intend to comply.

Despite repeated efforts to educate and enforce State and local law at this property, Bay Bridge Brewing is currently in non-compliance and the failure to operate in compliance with State and local health orders is an imminent health and safety risk.



 - b. Upon review of a revised Plan, the Health Officer may rescind this Order if it can be shown that social distancing and sanitation standards will be followed, live entertainment will not be permitted, and all State and local health orders will be complied with.
3. This Order shall be posted at the entrance of the building. All owners, operators, managers, employees, and contractors, who operate, or assist in the operation of Bay Bridge Brewing, or who use this facility in violation of this Order shall be considered in violation.
4. A copy of this Order shall be provided to Cal/OSHA.
5. Violation of this Order is subject to fine, imprisonment, or both. (California Health and Safety Code section 120295.)
6. Pursuant to Health and Safety Code section 120175.5 (b) the City of Chula Vista shall take all available measures within the City's control to ensure compliance with this Order in order to control the spread of the COVID-19.
7. This Order may be enforced by the Chula Vista Police Department pursuant to Government Code sections 26602 and 41601 and Health and Safety Code section 101029.
